Show Grooming Of The Longhair Dachshund

The coat of the longhair dachshund should be rather long and silky, reminding one of the Irish Setter. When bathing a longhair, a good creme rinse should follow each bath to add to the silkiness of the coat. Regular brushing and combing will loosen and remove any dead hair, stimulate the skin, distribute the natural oils throughout the coat, and allow for new coat growth. The bath water should be tepid to cool in temperature – water which is too warm or hot will cause damage and breakage of the coat.

The grooming done on the longhair dachshund is done to enhance his elegance and dachshund body shape. The most difficult of the longhairs to groom are the reds and chocolates because the undercoat on these dogs is usually lighter in color. With the lighter undercoat, areas that have been recently scissored are very obvious in the show ring. The reds and chocolates should be groomed about six to eight weeks before the dog is to be shown. Finishing touches and neatening can be done during the last week before the show. The dappled longhair dachshund presents a unique challenge in that the silver or white hairs of the dappled areas are generally coarser in texture, and give a harsher feel when freshly cut. It is best to do the major part of the grooming of the dappled dachshund six to eight weeks before the show date, whether they be chocolate, red or black and tan dapples. The black and tan longhair dachshund can be groomed closer to the date of

the show since the coat texture and color are uniform all over the body.

HEAD – Use a barber shear with rounded tips to cut the whiskers on the muzzle, checks, over the eyes, and under the chin. This should be done the day before the show, and the whiskers should be cut very close to the skin.

Some dogs have longer hairs on the head which give an unkempt appearance. These should be removed by either plucking with the thumb and index finger, or by using a pumice stone in a brushing motion in the direction in which the coat grows.

EARS – The coat on the ears should be long and lie flat against the ears. Some dogs, particularly puppies, have excess hair at the area where the ear joins the skull. This hair gives an overly wide appearance to the head, thus detracting from the elegant appearance. You can pluck out this hair, or you can use a thinning shear. In using thinning shears, place the blades under the coat near the top of the ear and cut only once or twice. Comb the hair where you have just cut and determine whether or not you should thin the area more. Too many cuts in the same area will create a bald spot! Continue to cut, comb, and evaluate until you create the desired effect.

The hair on the inside of the ear at the cheek area and around to the small flap on the inside back of the ear should be cut very close to allow the ear to lie flatter against the head and to outline the ear against the neck.

NECK – The neck should be long, lean, and taper into the shoulder area in a very elegant manner. Heavy coat growth tends to make the neck look too short. Thinning shears should be used from the back of the jaw down the front of the neck to a point just above the point of the breastbone. Hold the dog's head up with one hand and place the thinning shears under the coat against the skin and in line with the coat growth (never across the direction of coat growth). Cut once or twice, comb and see if you need to cut again. Thin the hair from the underside of the jaw down into a long full coat beginning just above he breastbone. Thin the total neck area to the point where the coat growth coming from the back of the neck joins the hair on the front of the neck on each side.

To groom the back of the neck, I prefer to begin with a "Magnet stripping blade". This gem of a tool has a very fine serrated edge and, when used like a comb, will remove an amazing amount of dead hair and undercoat without affecting the longer outercoat. Because of the very fine edge of this tool, use it slowly, and keep the skin taut in the area in which you are using it. It is possible to have the tiny "teeth" catch in a small fold of skin.

Comb with the Magnet stripping blade until no more coat comes out. If the neck area still looks too thick, use the thinning shears to achieve a sleek, elegant, lean look. Be sure to cut, comb and evaluate. The back of the neck should taper and blend into the shoulder area.

BODY – Again, use the Magnet stripping blade in a combing motion down the length of the body and down the sides to remove the dead

hair and undercoat. The body coat should lie flat and taper into a flowing coat on the sides and underside of the body. Thinning shears can be used judiciously on the body to enhance the topline and sleekness of the dog.

LEGS – The hair behind the front legs should form a pronounced feather. Heavy hair growth on the front legs can give the dog the appearance that his elbows point outward. To correct this, use the thinning shears on the outer sides of the front legs, particularly at the elbow area. This will give a close fitting look to the legs. The long hair on the back of the front legs should be combed toward the back of the body. If this coat is too profuse and tends to protrude to the sides, use thinning shears until the coat does comb back. It is also helpful to frequently dampen this hair and comb it back in order to train the hair growth.

The hair on the back of the thighs should also be long and full, but not protruding outward to the side of the back legs. Use the thinning shears to blend this coat into the upper thigh area.

FEET – Cut the hair on the bottom of the feet even with the pads. With the foot placed securely on a firm surface, trim the foot with a straight scissor. The desired look is a rounded, compact foot. You may have to scissor the top of the foot in the area of the nails to remove the wispy hairs which stick up over the nails. Do not cut the hair in an outline around the nails; rather, cut so as to blend this hair into a fully coated rounded appearance.

TAIL – The coat of the longhair dachshund should reach its greatest length on the underside of the tail, therefore little is done to the tail other than combing and brushing to maintain its condition.

Backing away: Why some dogs fear Judges

There can be any number of triggers that cause a dog to be wary but it's not what causes this to happen as much as what you do about it that matters.

Judges with hats. Judges in raincoats. Judges in long, flowing skirts. Judges who stare. Judges who hurl headlong toward your dog. These are just some of the scenarios that your dog has to face when a judge approaches them. If we leave the decision as to whether they should be fearful or not, then the decision our dog makes, might not be the decision we were hoping for in the show ring.

Consider this, for example. A team of zoologists following a pack of wild wolves on a hunt in Northern Europe were amazed to observe exactly how influential the decision making of the alpha of the pack can be while observing a challenge by a bull reindeer to protect the herd. Now, bull reindeer are not "Bambi". They can weigh upwards

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of 600Kg (1200 pounds) and are capable of killing wolves with a single kick let alone what they can do using their antlers. What amazed the zoologists was when a bull reindeer charged the herding wolves, if the alpha wolf held its ground, then all of the hunting pack would also hold their ground. Just as amazing, if the alpha wolf decided discretion was the better part of valour and left the hunt, all the pack would leave the hunt too. Even a young wolf that had previously challenged the alpha to lead the hunt (and lost) would not turn and bark at the bull reindeer. This illustrates just how reliant the pack is on the judgment of the alpha even when it comes to life and death.

The point is, if your dog is prone to backing away from the judge, then it's up to you to assume the role of TOP DOG. You can do this by

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applying the following.

YOUR POSTURE Stand tall: Do not lower yourself to nurture or console your dog of the impending danger i.e. the approaching judge, or reduce your height to the dog like you might if you are consoling a small child.Dogs interpret this human signal as a dog, not as a human and, to them, lowering yourself is an indication that you're fearful and don't want to be the leader. If this happens, then they must assume the role as TOP DOG. This means they must decide whether to run or stay. If you are the TOP DOG then this decision is yours - not your dog's.

POSITION Do not stand back behind your dog when the judge is approaching. This positioning puts your dog in the lead and thus in the role of decision maker. Place yourself as near to the front left eye line of your dog as you can. This lets your dog see that you're there and assessing what danger the judge represents. While you're doing this, make sure that you give the complete appearance of being calm and confident.

SIGNAL Your first signal should be a calming, voice aid to gain your dog's attention. Then, as outlined above, you use a sight aid to project stillness and calm. The third signal is touch (remember, all your signals should be calming), which requires you to gently apply pressure on the lead until your dog can feel the contact. You can then ease off the lead so that it is taut but not tight.

SHOW THE TEETH Distract your dog's attention away from the approaching judge and back to you by making a calming sound and exposing the bite. Make sure that you indicate your intention of showing the teeth to the judge when they are no closer than one metre (yard) away from your dog. You can find out more about showing the teeth here.

USE THE YOKE Once you've shown the judge your dog's teeth, place your hand with thumb and forefinger open behind your dog's occiput to display their head in the manner of being very proud of such a quality specimen. PER-SISTENCE Keep practicing. Remember, the TOP DOG is the one who never, never, EVER gives up Make this promise to your dog: If a situation is dangerous and you run away, your dog can run with you BUT if you decide that it's safe to stand your ground, then your dog must stand with you.




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

DCA members will be voting by mail on the standard revision reproduced below. New material is printed in red. Per DCA Bylaws, the revision requires a 2/3 majority to be adopted. The NMDC Board recommends to NMDC members that are also DCA members to vote "yes".

SMOOTH DACHSHUND

Color of Hair – although base color is immaterial, certain patterns and basic colors predominate. One-colored dachshunds include red and cream, with or without a shading of interspersed dark hairs. A small amount of white on the chest is acceptable, but not desirable. Nose and nails – black

Two-colored Dachshunds in-

clude black, chocolate, wild boar, gray (blue) and fawn (Isabella), each with deep, rich tan or cream markings over the eye, on the sides of the jaw and underlip, on the inner edge of the ear, front, breast, sometimes on the throat, inside and behind the front legs, on the paws and around the anus, and from there to about one-third to one-half of the length of the tail on the underside. Undue prominence of tan or cream markings is undesirable. A small amount of white on the chest is acceptable but not desirable. Nose and nails - in the case of black dogs, black; for chocolate and other colors, dark brown, but self-colored is acceptable.

Dappled dachshunds – the dapple (merle) pattern is expressed

as lighter-colored areas contrasting with the darker base color, which may be any acceptable color. Neither the light nor the dark color should predominate. Nose and nails are the same as for one-and two-colored Dachshunds. Partial or wholly blue (wall) eyes are as acceptable as dark eyes. A large area of white on the chest of a dapple is permissible.

Brindle is a pattern (as opposed to a color) in which black or dark stripes occur over the entire body although in some specimens the pattern may be visible only in the tan points.

Piebald is a pattern (as opposed to a color) with clearly defined areas and/or patches of white on any allowed one-colored or two-colored dogs. Two-colored piebald patterned dogs may show tan markings on the face and around the anus. There are no patches of lighter shadings within the colored areas as in the dapple pattern. Ticking in the white areas is acceptable. Eye color, eye rims, nose and lips are well pigmented and in accordance with the base color; eyes are never partially or wholly blue as distinguished from the dapple pattern. Eyes partially or wholly blue is a disqualification. Head must not be more than 50% white and color(s) other than white must cover both ears and

extend without interruption from the ears over both eyes. A head of more than 50% white or white on any portion of either ear, or around eyes is a disqualification. Pure white dogs with no body spots except on the head are to be disqualified. Nails may be partially or wholly white.

Sable – the sable pattern consists of a uniform dark overlay on red dogs. The overlay hairs are double-pigmented, with the tip of each hair much darker than the base color. The pattern usually displays a widow's peak on the head. Nose, nails and eye rims are black. Eyes are dark, the darker the better.

Colors or patterns other than those specified above are a disqualification.

Under Disqualifications:
DISQUALIFICATIONS: Knuckling over of front legs
In the piebald pattern:
Eyes partially or wholly blue, or
A head of more than 50% white, or
White covering any portion of
either ear, or around the eyes, or
Pure white with no body spots
except on the head.
Colors or patterns other than those
specified above.

Remember: In the NMDC standard "color is immaterial".

REQUIREMENTS FOR ORDERING ____NMDC TITLE ROSETTES

The National Miniature Dachshund club, Inc. offers beautiful purple and gold rosettes with your dog's name imprinted in gold to members whose Miniature Dachshunds have earned an AKC title. To qualify, the dog must represent three generations of miniature breeding and the request must be submitted within a year from the date on the certificate. Print your dog's name exactly as it is to appear on the rosette and send a copy of the AKC Title Certificate along with your signed statement "I certify that (dog's name) is from three generations of miniature breeding". Send your request to:
